

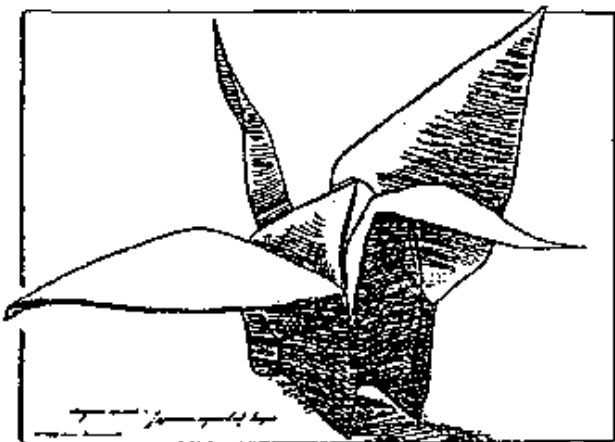
Remembering Hiroshima/Nagasaki

On August 6, 1945, the U.S. dropped
the first atomic bomb ever

on a human population,

On August 9, 1945, the U.S. dropped
the second such atomic bomb,
on Nagasaki, Japan

these bombings, and the death toll has
never stopped
